on and I recently went on a coach holiday to Torquay. We left home about 8.30 am and eventually arrived just after 5 pm as we had to pick up people on the way and drop off at two other hotels in Torquay. After a wash and unpacking we had our evening meal and then walked down the hill to Torre Gardens, These are very beautiful gardens which overlook the sea. There is also a pitch and putt course and a crazy golf course. I would love to have a go at these but as it was late we just sat and people

watched in the evening sunshine. The next day was a free day so we went to Torre Abbey. The building started as a medieval monastery, then a grand family home and is now a historic house, garden and art gallery. The ruins of the abbey, which was destroyed at the time of the Dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII, are still there and are very interesting. Windows rescued were used in the main house when the extension was built around 1803. The Palm House was fascinating as was Agatha Christie's

Potent Plants. The author lived in Torquay and used her knowledge of poisons from plants in her novels. After enjoying a cream tea (at lunch time) we got a bus to Paignton for the afternoon, On returning I went for a swim in the heated outdoor pool. Very refreshing! The next day we went to Totnes and Brixham. We visited the church of St Mary's. They are fortunate enough to have a Father Willis organ, which has been restored (1986) after an appeal for £25k. We stopped for coffee at



the Methodist church where there was a table top sale to be told coffee and cakes were free as it was John's birthday. Apparently John was running the table top sale. What a lovely church on the site for almost 1200 years.
Unfortunately during heavy bombing in 1941 the church was burnt out leaving only a shell. The rebuilt church was re-consecrated in 1957. There are six

gesture! Brixham was quite interesting with a marina and lots of boats. We next visited Buckfast Abbey which is the only English medieval monastery to be restored and used again for its original purpose. The monks here pray and work in the exact spot



Organises our social events like the Fish & Chips and Quiz Night, Fun Day, Parish Outings, Harvest Supper and Christmas Fayre.












Rev's End


'Renew and affirm your Christian vows' in church on Sunday in a short ceremony and blessing which includes these words:
